Matthew 2:12 - "And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road."

Happy New Year! As we flip the calendar to a new year, we are greeted in our Christian faith with Epiphany on January 6th. Epiphany is associated with the visit of the Wise Men to Jesus. They were guided by the Star of Bethlehem that announced the newborn king.

When I think about the story of the Magi, I am reminded of Courage. Courage is universally admired. But as much as we admire it, many of us misunderstand what courage is. Many believe courage is essentially the absence of fear. The courageous person, we think, is someone who is utterly fearless in the face of danger. But this understanding is actually closer to a definition of what courage *is not*, rather than what it *is*. Genuine courage is not the absence of fear but rather the capacity to go ahead in spite of your fear.

When we reflect on the Magi, this is precisely the kind of courage they exhibit. The Magi had the courage to set out on a journey to find something new. This journey they went on was long, tiresome, and had many obstacles, but they did not let that stop them from finding Christ; this new baby who was bringing something new to the world. The Magi also showed courage as they defied Herod's oppressive plans by choosing to leave for their own country by a different route instead of returning to him. The Magi's story teaches us to be open to new ideas and not close our minds to God's guidance.

What the Magi can teach us is as we move into the new year, and face whatever the year brings, we can look towards Christ's light, not allowing our fears to paralyze us or keep us

from moving forward. We can draw courage from knowing that God is with us even as we move through a place of fear.

We may not think of ourselves as courageous, but the fact is God has given us a far greater capacity for courage than we realize. And as January continues and we enter "ordinary time" of our liturgical year, the Magi remind us that there is nothing ordinary about living life in the present, in the here and now in the most radical ways that God asks us to live. The story of the Magi inspires hope that if we follow our epiphanies, if we rely on God, then we will, like the Wise Men, have our eyes open to new possibilities and new ways of seeing things.

God is at work in all our lives, and I know that if we allow God to work within us, we too, will be led to something new and experience the possibilities within our lives. May this year of new days bring to light the ways in which you can choose faith over fear courageously bringing forth God's light and love and being an inspiration to those you meet.
